Bulletin to First Nations in Alberta: May 14, 2021

Alberta has recently made some very exciting vaccine announcements, and opened up vaccine eligibility to all individuals 12 years of age and older. The Pfizer vaccine has been approved and deemed safe for children between the ages of 12-17, which will provide children and communities with protection against COVID-19, and bring us all closer to the immunization thresholds required to calm COVID-19 case numbers. As more individuals become vaccinated and the weather warms up, it may be tempting to bend the rules, but it is critical that everyone, including those that are fully vaccinated, continue to remain vigilant and adhere to public health measures until most individuals are fully vaccinated. While fully vaccinated individuals, are less likely to become severely sick with COVID-19, we do not know yet if the vaccine prevents people from spreading the virus. Emerging evidence is continuously being reviewed on asymptomatic and variant transmission and public health guidelines will be adjusted accordingly to reflect the evidence. We will keep you informed when rules for fully vaccinated people are changed.

Alberta: There are 24,586 Active Cases of COVID-19 in Alberta.

First Nations living on and off reserve (Alberta): There are **16,320** confirmed cases of COVID-19 to date and **142** deaths in First Nations living on and off reserve in Alberta. Confirmed cases are: **2,702** in Calgary Zone; **3,745** in Edmonton Zone; **1,367** in South Zone; **5,452** in North Zone; **3,049** in Central zone and **5** unknown. Testing in Alberta – Update

- As of May 13, 2021, the total number of reported swab samples collected to date in First Nation communities in Alberta is **123,031**.
- **Testing remains a powerful tool to help limit the spread.** Priority testing is available to individuals exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19; all close contacts of confirmed COVID-19 cases; and anyone linked to a known outbreak. If you have symptoms, please stay home and book a testing appointment.
- **Reminder:** Alberta has launched a <u>rapid testing screening program</u>. Employers, service providers, and interested schools, including those in First Nations communities can <u>apply</u> to the Government of Alberta to receive free rapid test kits for use in their organization.
- Reminder: Testing outside of the provincial testing criteria must be reviewed and supported by the ISC-AB MOHs. Please send testing enquiries to <u>sac.cdemergenciesab-urgencesmtab.isc@canada.ca.</u>

Vaccine Watch

COVID-19 Vaccine in First Nations Communities in Alberta as of May 13, 2021

- > 39,791 doses have been administered in 46 Nations (bands) in Alberta
- > 25,365 First Nations people living on reserve have received at least one dose
- > 14,426 First Nations people living on reserve are fully immunized (2 doses)
- > 3,723 First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on reserve have received their first dose

> 3,186 First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on reserve are fully immunized (2 doses)

New Developments

- Alberta Health has now opened vaccine eligibility to all Albertans aged 12 and over to receive their first dose. Please contact your local Health Centre for further information on how to receive a vaccine in your community. First Nations individuals living off-reserve can <u>book online</u>, or at a <u>participating</u> <u>pharmacy</u> or call 811.
- 2. Information on vaccinating those aged 12-17 is the same as vaccinating any other age group, with the exception being parental consent is needed. This consent can be written or verbal, but it is important to ensure parents and the child are fully informed on the vaccine and provide one of these forms of consent. The most recent NACI statement on vaccinating the 12-15 age group can be found <u>here</u>.
- 3. The ISC COVID-19 Toolkit has been updated and can be found on <u>OneHealth</u>.
- 4. PHAC has created a <u>COVID-19: Life after vaccination infographic</u> that shows the progression of relaxing public health restrictions, as more individuals become vaccinated.

Reminders

- 1. The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC), Thrombosis Canada and the National Collaborating Centre for Infectious Diseases (NNCID) present a <u>webinar</u> to inform health care providers on the treatment and reporting of Vaccine-induced Immune Thrombotic Thrombocytopenia (VITT).
- 2. ISC has developed a *What to expect when you get vaccinated* information sheet that can be found on <u>OneHealth</u> under COVID-19 Vaccine.
- Evidence shows first doses of vaccines used in Alberta provide considerable protection against infection and second doses are necessary to ensure an individual has both an antibody and cell mediated immune response. Individuals that book a first dose of vaccine will have their second dose administered within <u>4 months</u>.
- 4. Minor and temporary adverse events, such as headache, fever, fatigue, or pain at the injection site, are common after all vaccinations. All individuals are encouraged to seek medical attention if they experience any new or worsening symptoms and to report any adverse events after immunization.
- 5. PHAC has launched their webpage <u>Vaccines for COVID-19</u>: <u>What to expect at your vaccination</u>.
- 6. ISC-AB hosts a vaccine information session every Tuesday from 1-2 pm.
- 7. ISC has launched a <u>COVID-19 vaccine page</u> that is updated regularly.

Alberta's Relaunch - Update

- *[New]* Due to the rising number of COVID-19 cases and the presence of highly transmissible variants of concern, additional restrictions have been in place for <u>high case regions</u> as of May 5, 2021. Province-wide measures continue to apply to all other areas. The <u>additional measures</u> will remain in place for three weeks and will be extended if necessary. Some of the additional measures include:
 - All outdoor social gatherings must be limited to no more than five people and a maximum of two household contacts (cohorts). Mandatory physical distancing must be maintained at all times between members of different households. All indoor gatherings remain prohibited.

- Funerals or bereavement services are limited to a maximum of 10 people, including participants and guests. Funeral receptions and/or gatherings are not permitted.
- Working from home remains mandatory unless the employer requires the employee's physical presence to operate effectively.
- [New] Effective May 13th, the rules around exemptions from <u>wearing a mask due to a medical</u> <u>condition</u> are changing. Individuals are now required to obtain a medical exception letter verifying their health condition from an authorized health-care provider (nurse practitioner, physician or psychologist).

COVID-19 Variants of Concern

- As of May 13th, 575 VOCs have been detected in 34 First Nations communities in Alberta. Currently
 there are 247 active VOCs in 22 First Nations Communities on-reserve in Alberta. Due to changes in the
 VOC screening process, active variant cases are based on a sample of positive cases only and should
 not be considered representative of total COVID-19 cases.
- [New] Variants of Concern (VOC) now make up a significant proportion of COVID-19 cases in Alberta. As such, Alberta Health announced changes to the public health follow-up of cases and contacts of COVID 19. FNIHB has changed processes to align with the new provincial guidelines and Alberta Health Services. Variant Screening for COVID-19 cases are as follows:
 - The provincial lab will no longer be running variant screening on all positive COVID-19 samples. Instead it will run the variant screening on positive samples from the following groups:
 - Those tested in the emergency room or admitted to hospital
 - Those tested as part of an outbreak
 - Health Care Workers
 - o Recent international travelers

Samples tested in First Nations using a rapid testing machine will also be screened for VOC.

• [New] WHO recognizes B.1.617, first detected in India, as a VOC. The Public Health Agency of Canada will be updating its guidance shortly around this VOC. The most recent statement on VOCs made by Canada's Chief Public Health Officer can be viewed <u>here</u>.

What the Government of Canada and ISC/FNIHB-AB Are Doing

- [New] Infrastructure Canada is currently accepting applications for retrofits and new building projects for community buildings. <u>Applications</u> for projects under \$3 million are being accepted on an ongoing basis and applications for projects that are between \$3 million and \$25 million are being accepted until July 6.
- Reminder: Nations that require additional surge supports for COVID-19 response or vaccine clinics including contact tracing, testing, vaccine administration support should submit a <u>request form</u> to ISC-AB at: <u>sac.cdemergenciesab-urgencesmtab.isc@canada.ca</u>.

Mental Health and Wellness

- *[New]* The National Collaborating Centre for Indigenous Health is hosting a <u>webinar</u> on First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples and physical activity during COVID-19. It will focus on strategies and innovative approaches that prioritize Indigenous experiences, practices and community voices within this field.
- [New] Mark Amy Treatment Centre is launching a Virtual Addiction Treatment Program from June 14 July 30. This program is open to all First Nations persons in Alberta, and applications will be accepted until June 7, 2021. Virtual Care Clinic

[New] The Alberta Indigenous Virtual Care Clinic (AIVCC) has updated their hours and they are now open until 8:30pm on Wednesdays. The AIVCC serves individuals self-identifying as First Nations, Inuit and Métis and their families. 




Fig 1. COVID-19 cases in First Nations communities in Alberta by onset day, May 13, 2021

In general, the number of daily confirmed and probable COVID-19 cases in First Nations communities in Alberta has been increasing since the beginning of April 2021 (Fig 1).









Fig 3. Active COVID-19 cases in First Nations communities in Alberta, May 13, 2021

In general, the number of daily active confirmed and probable COVID-19 cases in First Nations communities in Alberta have been increasing since mid-April 2021 (Fig 3).





Individuals between the ages of 10 and 39 years accounted for 52.1% of all cases in First Nations communities in Alberta and 50.5% of all cases in Alberta. Females accounted for 51.1% of all cases in First Nations communities in Alberta and 49.2% among all Albertans.





Fig 5. COVID-19 cases in First Nations communities in Alberta by onset week and VOC status, May 13, 2021

Five hundred and seventy-five (575) VOCs have been detected and currently there are 247 active VOCs in 22 First Nations Communities making up 60.4% of all active COVID-19 cases in communities.

A total 39,791 COVID-19 vaccine doses have been administered to 25,365 people in First Nations communities in Alberta, of whom 14,426 are fully immunized with two doses.
