# **Papal Visit**

### Indigenous Services Canada support

His Holiness Pope Francis is preparing to visit Canada from July 24 to 29, 2022, to advance reconciliation between the Roman Catholic Church and Indigenous Peoples. This visit is being organized by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops in consultation with Indigenous partners.

The Government of Canada is providing support to First Nation, Inuit, and Métis, urban and off-reserve Indigenous organizations and communities for community-led initiatives related to the July 2022 papal visit and the legacy of residential schools —such as healing activities, events, ceremonies and travel for Survivors.

# **COVID Information**

### Variants of concern in Alberta

A seventh wave has been declared in Ontario by its Chief Medical Officer of Health. There have been stories in the media speculating on whether Alberta has entered a seventh wave, fueled by the BA.5 variant.

In Alberta, Alberta Health is actively monitoring variants of concern through laboratory PCR testing and wastewater surveillance . BA.5 is now the dominant strain in Alberta and is the same strain that is responsible for rapid increase in COVID cases in Ontario. Currently there is no evidence that BA.5 or BA.4 cause more severe disease in those infected compared to earlier Omicron sub-lineages such as BA.2. However, BA.5 and BA.4 appear to transmit more readily due to their ability to evade a person's immunity gained from immunization or prior infection. To reduce your risk of hospitalization and death due to COVID-19, it is important to receive as many COVID-19 vaccines including booster doses that you qualify for as soon as possible. Alberta Health has not yet provided details on the next round of boosters, however they may come as early as August and they will be critical as we move into the Fall.

### Alberta updates COVID-19 PCR testing program

There are no changes to testing in First Nation, Inuit and Métis communities. However, beginning July 18, several eligibility and operational changes to the PCR testing program off reserve will come into effect. Tests to inform clinical treatment will need a referral from a medical professional and some testing locations will change. Alberta will continue to provide PCR COVID-19 testing for Albertans most at risk of severe illness and who live or work in high-risk settings. Eligible Albertans who live or work in high-risk settings can continue to self-refer through the AHS assessment tool. This includes:

- People with symptoms who live or work in isolated and remote First Nation, Inuit and Métis communities.
- Health-care and continuing care workers and workers in specific high-transmission risk settings such as correctional facilities and shelters.

Individuals living or working in isolated and remote First Nation, Inuit and Métis communities will continue to access testing in their community. To learn more, please click <u>here</u>.

### Rapid tests available from Alberta Health

Alberta Health is making a summer offering of COVID-19 rapid tests to communities.

To make a request, please email Alberta Health at <u>rapidtesting@gov.ab.ca</u> with the amount of tests required. Orders will be processed and shipped as they are received. Reporting on usage to Alberta Health is not required.

Even if they aren't needed this summer, communities can still request rapid tests from Alberta Health at **<u>rapidtesting@gov.ab.ca</u>** at a later time and, rapid tests remain available **<u>via pharmacies</u>** for at-home testing.

### **Monkeypox in Alberta**

Monkeypox is a rare disease that is caused by infection with Monkeypox virus. The virus is related to the smallpox virus, but typically causes less serious disease. Starting in May 2022, monkeypox cases are being identified in countries where it is not typically found. The Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) has now <u>confirmed cases in Canada</u>, including Alberta, but the risk to the general public is considered low.

FNECP's annual Call for Proposals aims to support First Nations working in collaboration with scientists to identify, investigate and characterize environmental hazards with potential for human health impacts. The program supports community-based monitoring, research, risk communication and knowledge integration.

#### Call for Applications: Climate Change and Health Adaptation 2023-24


The Climate Change and Health Adaptation Program (CCHAP) for First Nations South of 60°N at Indigenous Services Canada is launching a Call for Applications for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. This funding is available for First Nation communities south of 60°N for community designed and driven projects focused on adapting to the health impacts of climate change. Similar to last year, you will be asked to submit an abstract, and if your abstract is selected you will then be invited to submit a full proposal at a later date. The deadline for submitting abstracts to the CCHAP team is **September 23, 2022**.

### VACCINE SNAPSHOT



124.770 doses of vaccine have been administered in 46 Nations (bands) in Alberta.

At least 54.8% of First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on-reserve or crown land have received three doses of the vaccine.

At least 8.5% of First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on-reserve or crown land have received four doses of the vaccine.



At least 19.6% of First At least 88.6% of First Nations people 12+ living on-reserve or crown land have received three doses of the vaccine.

# Final settlement agreement on compensation signed for First Nations children and families

On July 4, Canada, the Assembly of First Nations (AFN), and the plaintiffs in the Moushoom and Trout class actions announced that a final settlement agreement has been signed, regarding compensation for First Nations children and families harmed by discriminatory underfunding of the First Nations Child and Family Services program and the federal government's narrow definition of Jordan's Principle. The agreement ensures fair compensation for survivors and their families who suffered because of the discriminatory underfunding of services. The next step is to bring the final settlement agreement to the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal asking for the Tribunal's confirmation that the settlement satisfies its orders on compensation. The final settlement agreement will then be brought to the Federal Court of Canada for approval. If approved, the process to implement the settlement will begin. To read more, click <u>here</u>.

### Indigenous Peoples Economic and Trade Cooperation Arrangement (IPETCA)

IPETCA was endorsed on June 23 and is the first trade arrangement of its kind to recognize and support Indigenous businesses and entrepreneurs on a global scale. ### Capital grants for Indigenous community-owned businesses

As of June 30, Indigenous community-owned businesses can apply for capital grants through the Aboriginal Business Investment Fund (ABIF). Eligible businesses can apply for up to \$500,000 in capital funding for ventures that improve socio-economic outcomes for their communities. Eligible projects should be close to starting operations or breaking ground within the fiscal year following funding. To learn more, please click <u>here</u>.

### **Applications Open - Civil Society Fund**

All sectors and sizes of organizations can now apply for grants up to \$500,000 through the third round of the Civil Society Fund to help address challenges Albertans are facing in the wake of the pandemic, including homelessness, unemployment, domestic violence and sexual violence. Funding is intended to help civil society transform how community organizations function, innovate and work together to address pressing social challenges.
