Updates

CBSA Land Border Updates:

The border remains closed for people who are not traveling by right or for non-essential purposes. There are some new regulations for those who are entering Canada by right. Molecular testing is now mandatory, and must be completed 72 hours prior to arrival in Canada. The test will need to be provided at the border. There is also a requirement to register your travel online or through the Arrive Can App prior to your arrival at the border. If you are unable to do so, you have the option to make a declaration in person at the Port of Entry/border. Upon arrival at the border, you will be provided with two COVID-19 tests and will be required to self-administer the tests on day one and day ten of the 14 day quarantine period. You will also be required to provide your quarantine plan and to check in when required with Public Health. If somebody arrives at the border with symptoms of COVID-19, they will be referred to a Public Health officer on site, and will be provided with a test. Depending on an individual's quarantine plan they may be directed to quarantine at an approved location to stay at their own expense.

COVID-19 Contingency Funding:

As we continue to await budget announcements, we would like to share with you that there is funding available through our COVID-19 Contingency Fund to support Nations in responding to outbreaks, if and as they arise. This funding is limited and only available to communities experiencing an outbreak, and is not intended to support other activities related to COVID-19. This funding is the residual amount from the third iteration of the Indigenous Community Support Fund (ICSF). To access this funding, communities must submit a request outlining details of their outbreak emergency to sac.cdemergenciesab-urgencesmtab.isc@canada.ca. Please note that the ICSF proposal template previously provided may also be used to submit requests, if preferred. For needs outside of COVID-19 outbreaks, alternate funding streams are anticipated to be introduced in the coming weeks and further communication will be provided as information becomes available. If you have any questions or require further information, please contact your Community Liaison Team (CLT).

Canadian Budget 2021:

Canada has made a historic investment of over \$18 billion to close the gaps between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples, supporting healthy, safe, and prosperous Indigenous communities, and advancing meaningful reconciliation with First Nations. Question of the Day

Q: Can you get COVID after being vaccinated?

A: According to clinical trial data, the Pfizer/BioNtech vaccine is 95 percent effective at preventing Covid-19 disease. The Moderna vaccine is 94 percent. None is 100 percent effective at preventing the illness. It is possible to get sick with COVID-19 — or possibly carry the virus asymptomatically — after being fully vaccinated. These are called breakthrough infections.

While rare, with the pandemic entering a third wave and the number of the people receiving vaccines increasing, breakthrough infections are inevitable. The good news is, preliminary studies have indicated that when these breakthrough infections do occur, they're not as bad as they would have been had the person not been vaccinated. The likelihood of breakthrough infections will decline as more of the population is vaccinated, but these cases reinforce why public health measures need to be followed for the foreseeable future.

Vaccine Update



AstraZeneca - Availability and Risks:

For your off reserve members, participating pharmacies and Alberta Health Services will begin booking appointments for AstraZeneca vaccinations for Albertans born in 1981 or earlier. Walk-in vaccinations will be available at the walk-in clinics in Edmonton and Calgary, as well as specific pharmacies across the province. Alberta's decision to reduce the age of eligibility for AstraZeneca from 55 to 40 is based on public health recommendations looking at the benefit this vaccine offers weighed against the small risk of adverse events from this vaccine. AstraZeneca is approximately 80% protective two weeks after the first dose and has been shown to reduce infection by 60-70 per cent, and severe outcomes like hospitalization by 80 per cent.

We do acknowledge a case of the rare blood clot disorder known as VITT in Alberta. While every adverse reaction is unfortunate, it is important to remember that these blood clots are extremely rare and that this vaccine helps prevent the much higher risks that come from COVID-19 infection. As the COVID-19 vaccine rollout advances in Canada, Health Canada and the Public Health Agency of Canada will continue to monitor the use of all COVID-19 vaccines closely and examine and assess any new safety concerns. Based on all of the evidence available internationally to-date, Health Canada continues to consider that the benefits of the AstraZeneca and COVISHIELD vaccines to protect against COVID-19 outweigh the potential risks.

Tracking Potential Side-Effects of Vaccines:

Beginning in early May, anyone receiving a vaccine will be able to volunteer for a method of tracking potential side-effects. This is voluntary and the individual can opt out anytime. After each dose the person will receive a text message one day after the shot and seven days after the shot (four texts in total). It will direct the individual to a link where they will answer nine yes/no questions so it's a very quick process. No personal information will be collected. The information will inform the MOHs of trends following vaccinations in First Nations. The individual may be contacted by a health professional depending on their responses. Anyone can take part in this project, the only requirement is having a phone that can receive text messages. Posters and information documents are being sent to all health centres and communities in the near future and we will continue to communicate as this pilot project gets underway. At least **8,140** First Nations people have received two doses of the vaccine.
