Easing of Public Health Restrictions in Alberta

On February 8, 2022, the Government of Alberta announced the easing of public health restrictions as the province moves towards an endemic approach to the COVID-19 pandemic. The approach is staged and we are currently in stage one. Effective February 9th the Restrictions Exemption Program and capacity limits (except for large venues) were removed. Starting February 14th there will be no masking requirements for children aged 12 and under in any setting, and no masking requirement in any schools for children and youth of all ages. \$121.5 M in direct public health funding – Income Assistance support

Alberta Region was allotted just over \$14 M of the additional \$121.5 million in funding for COVID-19. These funds will provide assistance to individuals and families in receipt of Income Assistance on-reserve by providing additional COVID-19 funding to address the increase in essential living expenses and keep community members safe. In discussions with ISC, First Nation communities and organizations may identify alternative options deemed to be of greater benefit for Income Assistance clients. Question of the Day

Q: How have international border measures changed?

A: Tuesday, the Government of Canada announced a series of adjustments to the current border measures, representing the beginning of a phased easing of travel restrictions.

- Beginning February 28th, travellers arriving to Canada from any country, who qualify as <u>fully vaccinated</u>, will be randomly selected for arrival testing.
- Travellers selected will also no longer be required to quarantine while awaiting their test result.
- Travellers will now have the option of using a COVID-19 rapid antigen test result
- The Government of Canada will adjust its Travel Health Notice from a Level 3 to a Level 2. This means that the Government will no longer recommend that Canadians avoid travel for nonessential purposes.

On January 26th, the Government of Canada announced the withdrawal of its judicial review application before the Federal Court regarding the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) order on funding for capital assets, 2021 CHRT 41. Canada will move forward with funding for the purchase and construction of capital assets (e.g. buildings) to support the delivery of the First Nations Child and Family Services program and Jordan's Principle services. Vaccine Update

Update to Alberta Vaccine Recommendations

Effective February 15, 2022, Alberta will be allowing additional doses for the following age groups with certain health conditions that may put them at higher risk of severe outcomes of COVID-19:

- First Nations, Métis and Inuit youth aged 12 to 17 year old are eligible for a third dose, provided 5 months have passed since their last dose of a COVID-19 vaccine.
- Adolescents 12 to 17 years of age with eligible underlying health conditions will be able to book a third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.
- Adolescents 12 to 17 years of age with certain immunocompromising conditions who may have received a three-dose primary series are now eligible for a fourth dose booster.
- Children 5 to 11 years of age with certain immunocompromising conditions will be eligible to book a third dose of the COVID-19 vaccine as part of a three-dose primary series.

Booking begins February 15, and eligible immunocompromised Albertans 5 to 11 years of age are recommended to schedule their third dose at least 8 weeks following their second dose of a COVID-19 vaccine.

Update on Sotrovimab and Paxlovid in First Nations Communities

As of February 14th, at least 11 individuals have been treated with Sotrovimab in First Nations communities. Paxlovid use is increasing across the province, but there is no First Nations specific data available at present. Potentially eligible Individuals should call Healthlink to determine how to access treatment. Sotrovimab and Paxlovid are useful in reducing the risk of serious outcomes in some COVID-19 infected patients individuals, however these medications are not a substitute for immunization. We are actively engaged with Alberta Health Services to improve the accessibility of Paxlovid and Sotrovimab on reserve



Vaccine Snapshot *as of February 13, 2022



116,773 doses of vaccine have been administered in 46 Nations (bands) in Alberta.



At least **87.7%** of First Nations people 12+ living on-reserve or crown land have received their **first dose** of the vaccine.



At least **96.4%** of First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on-reserve or crown land have received **two doses** of the vaccine.



At least 15.5% of First Nations people living on-reserve or crown land have received three doses of the vaccine.
