ISC - Alberta Region COVID-19 Update for Chiefs: *February* 17th, 2021



Updates

COVID-19 Variants:

The Government of Canada has a monitoring program in place with provinces and territories to identify new COVID-19 virus variants in Canada, such as the ones originating in the United Kingdom (B.1.1.7), South Africa (B.1.351) and Brazil (P.1). Alberta has confirmed the presence of two of these variants, the U.K and South African variant and have been linked to outbreaks in school's in the Calgary area. The Government's understanding of the variants is growing daily. The understanding is that the three main variants of concern identified so far make the virus more infectious, allowing it to spread more easily. There is also preliminary evidence that some variants have an impact on the efficacy of some vaccines and drugs, but more research is needed to confirm these findings. The Canadian and global medical, public health and research communities are actively evaluating these variants and other significant mutations. More information on COVID variants here. To stop the spread of this virus, we must ensure strict adherence to the public health guidelines that are in place. The Government of Alberta has announced that should a person test positive for a Variant of Concern, and choose to stay in their own home to isolate, household contacts need to stay at home in guarantine until 14 days have passed from the end of the case's isolation period, which is 10 days. This means, household contacts that stay at home, need to guarantine for 24 days. Should an off-reserve member of your Nation be exposed or test positive with a variant, it is recommended that member avoid travel and guarantine where they are in order to avoid any risk of the variant spreading further. Critical Worker Benefit

Last week, the Government of Alberta announced the critical worker benefit for approximately 380,000 public and private-sector workers who are eligible to receive one-time payments of \$1,200 for putting themselves at risk on the job during the COVID-19 pandemic. Eligible employees working in First Nations communities are eligible to receive the benefit. Employers must apply for the benefit on behalf of their workers. Additional details regarding eligibility and deadlines will be available today (February 17th). For questions and concerns, the Province's Critical Worker Benefit program staff are available 8:15 am to 4:30 pm (Monday to Friday, closed statutory holidays) at 310-4455 or <u>cwb@gov.ab.ca</u>. Question of the Day

Q: Is it safe and recommended those with diabetes take the vaccine?

A: Yes, the vaccine is recommended for people with underlying health conditions, such as diabetes and/or heart disease. This is because most people with underlying health conditions are vulnerable to developing a severe illness if they do get coronavirus, and vaccines are the most effective way to prevent that from happening. However, it is always recommended you speak with your doctor or local health practitioner for information and guidance on when you and your family should receive the vaccine.

Safety and side effects of COVID-19 vaccine

Temporary reactions to vaccines are a common and natural response to receiving a vaccine dose. These inflammatory reactions can last between a few hours to a few weeks after administration but do not disrupt daily life. Severe or permanent reactions are **extremely** rare. Once a vaccine is in use, Canada has a strong vaccine safety monitoring system that involves healthcare professionals, vaccine manufacturers, the provinces and territories, the Public Health Agency of Canada, and Health Canada, to alert public health authorities of changing trends or unusual adverse events that were not previously reported. 4,524 doses of vaccine have been administered in **39** Nations (bands) in Alberta.



At least **3,976** First Nations people have receive their first dose



At least **1,953** First Nations people aged 65 years and older living in reserve or crown land have received their first dose.



At least **35** First Nations people aged 65 years and older have receive two doses of the vaccine.



At least **251** First Nations people have receive two doses of the vaccine.
