### **Rapid Testing in Schools**

Alberta Education's Kindergarten to Grade 6 At-Home Rapid Testing Program has been extended to include all Kindergarten? to Grade 12 students attending schools in First Nations. *Outbreak status is not required* for First Nation schools wanting to participate in the program. Rapid screening tests are another tool, along with health measures already in place at schools, to keep students and staff safe. Participation is voluntary for students and staff. Alberta Education will be providing more information <u>here</u> about the program to First Nation Education Authorities in the coming days. ## **US Land Boarder Open to Recreational Travel**

On November 8<sup>th</sup> the US land border re-opened for recreational travellers. When returning to Canada, it is recommend that all travellers regularly check the COVID-19 testing requirements for re-entry into Canada which can be found <u>here</u> as requirements maybe subject to change.

## **Changes to US Air Travel Rules**

On November 8<sup>th</sup>, those travelling to the US by air must provide proof of a negative molecular or antigen COVID-19 test taken within three days before their flight's departure AND those over the age of 18 must provide proof that they are fully vaccinated. Children under 18 will be exempt from the proof-of-vaccination requirement, but those between the ages of 2 and 17 will be required to show proof of a negative Covid-19 test. These rules are subject to change so it is recommend that travellers regularly check the travel rules found <u>here.</u>

### **REMINDER: Proof of Vaccine Requirements in Alberta as of** November 15<sup>th</sup>

As of November 15<sup>th</sup>, businesses and operators participating in the Restrictions Exemption Program will only be accepting Alberta proof of vaccination with a QR code. QR codes can be downloaded <u>here</u>. Vaccine records from First Nations, military, other provinces, and international travellers will continue to be accepted as proof of vaccination.



## **Question of the Day**

#### **Q:** What is sotrovimab?

A: Sotrovimab is a monoclonal antibody, a type of protein that attaches to the surface of the coronavirus that causes COVID-19. Sotrovimab prevents the virus from entering healthy cells in your body. Health Canada has authorized sotrovimab to treat mild to moderate COVID-19 that has been confirmed by testing. Sotrovimab is used to prevent these mild to moderate symptoms from getting worse in people who have a high risk of needing to go to the hospital for COVID-19. Alberta Health Services is offering some Albertans sotrovimab to treat mild to moderate COVID-19 symptoms in a limited number of settings. AHS intendeds to expand access to sotrovimab to more areas of the province as soon possible. Sotrovimab is not a replacement for immunization against COVID-19 and all eligible individuals are strongly encouraged to get the COVID-19 vaccine. # **Vaccine Update**

### Changes to vaccine eligibility to book a third dose of COVID-19 vaccine

Starting November 8, the following Albertans are eligible to book a third dose, six months after they have received their second dose:

- All Albertans aged 70 and older
- First Nations, Métis, and Inuit (FNMI) people aged 18 and older
- Front-line health-care workers who received their first two doses less than eight weeks apart
- Albertans who received two doses of AstraZeneca or one dose of Jansen while abroad

Emerging evidence and <u>recent recommendations made by the National</u> <u>Advisory Committee on Immunization</u> (NACI) suggest immunity levels and protection against severe outcomes may decline sooner in certain groups. The vaccine continues to be very safe and receiving a third dose will help boost immunity levels and improve protection.

# Health Canada reviewing use of Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine for kids 5 to 11 years old

Vaccines for children aged 5 – 11 are still under review. Doses have been set aside in USA and will be delivered as soon as Health Canada gives final approval. This could be as soon as mid-November.

## **Canada obtaining Johnson & Johnson doses**

Canada will take delivery of Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine doses in the coming weeks, with the goal of boosting vaccination rates among those who prefer this vaccine.



### Vaccine Snapshot \*as of November 8<sup>th\*</sup>



**93,359** doses of vaccine have been administered in **46** Nations (bands) in Alberta.



At least **79%** of First Nations people living on-reserve or crown land have received their **first dose**.



**100%** of First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on-reserve or crown land have received their first dose.



**92.3%** of First Nations people aged 65 years and older living on-reserve or crown land have received two doses of the vaccine.



At least **63.1%** of First Nations people living on-reserve or crown land have received **two** doses of the vaccine.
