ISC - Alberta Region COVID-19 Update for Chiefs: *July 15, 2020*

Updates

Second Wave:

A second wave of COVID-19 would be an increase or spike of cases after the initial wave of infections has decreased and stabilized. This is still a new virus and there is no certainty on what will happen to the infection moving forward, but preparations for a continued response to COVID-19 is prudent. This could include reviewing the lessons learned from the start of the pandemic in March and updating your pandemic plan. Preventing a second wave depends almost entirely on us all. Physical distancing, wearing non-medical masks when distancing is not possible, good hand hygiene, staying home if you are feeling unwell and getting tested if you have any symptoms is a shared responsibility and the best way to avoid or minimize the impact of a second wave. From the modelling available to us, adhering to the public health directives can cut the number of daily infections, hospitalizations and deaths by much more than half. We continue to monitor the Alberta situation closely and your health directors are meeting with both AHS and ISC regularly.

Masks For Albertans:

Once again, the Government of Alberta will be providing masks for all residents. Specifically for First Nations, this will be double the previous order and will be made available directly to your Nations. Questions regarding this mask program can be directed to your provincial contact or calling 211. All are encouraged to wear nonmedical masks in public when it's difficult to maintain physical distancing of 2 meters at all times. Masks should complement – not replace – other prevention measures. Continue physical distancing and good hand hygiene, and stay home when sick.

Question of the Day

Q: What type of costs are eligible for additional public health support for First Nations during COVID-19?

A:Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) works with Indigenous communities in the provinces to support the public health response to COVID-19 with additional funding of \$285 million. Examples of COVID-19 public health expenses that may be supported include costs related to:

- Supplies and storage
- Surge health infrastructure
- Staffing and surge capacity
- Mental health and wellbeing
- Food security to support physical isolation
- Perimeter security
- Supports to update, review or activate pandemic response plans
- Working with other governments
- Translation of documents or messages into Indigenous languages, English or French

COVID Funding for Forest Operations

The Government of Canada will provide up to \$30 million to offset additional costs associated with COVID-19 safety measures for small and medium enterprises in the forest sector, including tree-planting operations. The government intends to work with the provinces and territories to deliver this funding, which will preserve jobs for forest sector workers. The investment will help cover extra costs for things like sanitizing stations, additional accommodations and/or transportation, facilities and services to maintain social distancing, and personal protective equipment.
